More Local Enlistments

As men continue to enlist from this and surrounding districts, local patriotic organisations are redoubling their efforts in order to provide comforts for them. It is a grand co-operative movement, and is helping to strengthen Australia and the British Empire by its unity of purpose.

It is expected that more than forty local men will be farewelled at Camden later this month, when the Camden Soldiers and Citizens' Association holds its second function. The date will be definitely decided at a meeting to be held on this Thursday night, and particulars will appear in our next issue. In order that no local A.I.F. soldier will be overlooked, relatives of enlisted men are asked to immediately call at this newspaper office and furnish us with the young Diggers' camp addresses.

Kevin King, of the Picton Post Office staff, who resided at Broughton-street, Camden is attached to an A.I.F. signalling section at the Sydney Showground. His mother and sister (Doreen), who now reside at Harris Park, keep in touch with this district per medium of the "Camden Advertiser."

Jack N. Dunk, Southern Districts sales representative of the Howard Rotary Hoe, who conducted businesses at both Camden and Picton, is now on artilleryman at the Showground. His brother, E. C. (Cliff) Dunk, of Camden, served in the Great War of 1914-1918.

Another Camden business man to enlist is Ernest H. McGrath, who hopes to dispose of his blacksmith's forge before he enters camp with the Engineers on July 13. Ern arrived at Camden from Orange at the age of two months, parents are Mr. and Mrs. E. M. McGrath, of Broughton Street He will resign the hon. secretaryship of Camden District Tennis Association at this week's meeting. Ern has always been keenly interested in local sport, particularly tennis, cricket, football and athletics.

Two mates to enlist together in the 4th Battalion are Donald Atfield and Horace Gander. They are at Liverpool Camp.

Don is a son of Nurse Atfield, of Camden, and the late Albert Atfield. His father was a member of the 1st A.I.F. Don has played cricket in the local district competitions for a number of seasons.

Horace, a former Camden footballer, moved to Randwick with his parents Last year.

Private Thomas Guyer, also of the 4th Battalion at Liverpool, popped into this office on Saturday. He is a company mate to Horace Gander and Don Atfield.

We had a note at the week-end from Private Thomas O'Brien, formerly of the Carrington Convalescent Hospital staff at Camden, who has spent a month with the Army Medical Corps at Sydney Showground. (We are always pleased to hear from the boys.)

F. J. D. Doust, a prominent local dairyman, of "Lynn Farm," Camden, is awaiting a final medical examination before entering an A.I.F. camp. 
Office-bearers elected at Monday's meeting were:



SHELL COMPANY SEARCHES FOR OIL.

On Thursday Night last the Shell Company, in conjunction with Clifton Bros (Camden) Ply. Lid, gave very excellent film programme to a large audience at the Paramount theatre, Camden. The programme was most interesting and entertaining two of the films in particular—"Cavalcade of Empire" and "Through the Centre" a record of the Shell Mapping Expedition on the Adelaide, Perth, Darwin, Adelaide route being outstanding. Mr. S. L. Roberts, Sydney Executive of the Company, spoke for a few minutes on the national aspect of his Company's operations, with particular reference to the war effort. Mr. Roberts said "Apart from the substantial nature of the assistance given by Shell to the Allies on the other side of the world, we are at present engaged in Australia in an intensive search for oil, which, if successful, will revolutionise the industrial development and defence of the Commonwealth. "At n cost-of thousands of pounds per month a large Shell organisation is now at work in South Western Queensland in an intensive search for oil. A successful result, combined with our- refinery facilities at Clyde in N.S.W., and refineries which must become necessary in other States would be an epoch-making event in Australia.
