# 6<sup>th</sup> June 1940 DISTRICT RALLIES TO WAR EFFORT Many Enlistments: Patriotic Committees Busy

While many local district men are enlisting for service abroad, the activities of citizens' patriotic bodies have increased, and a number of new organisations have been formed to play their part in Australia's war effort. On this front page and on page 3 will be found reports of intensified action throughout this rural area.

The only two sons of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Hall, of Elderslie, have joined the colours. Edward (Ted) Hall is now in Palestine, while his brother, Harry, is a gunner in the Field Artillery, encamped at Ingleburn. In the same battery are Ronald Hughes and Tony Whitely, of Camden.

Two Camden brothers, Joseph and David Dunbar, of Broughton-street, hoped to sail together. Joe was accepted, but Dave was disappointed as he failed to pass the eye-sight test.

The Goff brothers George and James are in camp. George (better known locally as "Dick" who was timber-cutting here for the past three years, is a sapper in the Engineers at Ingleburn. Jim is stationed at the R.A.S. Showground with the Ordnance Corps. Both lads originally came from the Ganmain River district.

Several R.A.A.F. members, stationed at Macquarie Grove, arranged a farewell surprise party for James Lee, who entered Ingleburn Camp on Monday. Jim, who is a well-known boxing enthusiast, has resided at

Camden for the past 12 years. He was born at Tamworth. Jim will "do his bit" with the Infantry.

A Narellan resident to enter camp this week is Fred Roy Adams, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Adams of that centre. Allan Hay, of The Oaks, who will serve in the Army Service Corps, has been dairying in the Camden-Picton districts for the past 13 years. He was a member of the former-day St. John's Dramatic Society at Camden.

Although he will not attain the age of 20 until next month, Thomas O'Brien, of the Carrington Convalescent Hospital staff, has filled-in his enlistment papers at Camden Council Chambers. Tom was born at Kensington.

Others to complete their papers at Camden are Mervyn W. Small, Douglas K. Armstrong and John F. Duck. The latter is the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Duck of Orangeville.

Two sons of Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Moffitt, of "Freshfields," Cobbitty, will serve their country; Clifford W. Moffitt is a gunner in an anti-aircraft battery, while Raymond (Jim) Moffitt will enter the Infantry ranks this week. Several other local district men are awaiting medical examination. A small percentage failed to "past he doctor'.' after the enlistment paper had been completed.

#### MOTORIST KILLED WHEN CAR OVERTURNED.

Found by a passing motorist lying unconscious in an overturned car last week on the Razorback section of the Hume Highway between Camden and Picton, Paul Victor Paulsen, aged 74, of 16 Glencoe Street, Caulfield, Victoria, died some five hours later in Camden District Hospital as the result of a fractured skull.

Dr. R. M. Crookston and Constable H. C. Haylock, of Camden, journeyed to the scene of the accident as soon as word was received here. Marks indicated that the car had travelled for about 35 yards off the roadway before it struck a culvert and capsized.

FLYING SCHOOL DUST: Affects Airmen's Throats

A number of airmen suffering from inflamed throats have been admitted to Camden District Hospital during the past fortnight.

The infections are said to have been due to the dust at the R.A.A.F Central Flying School at Macquarie Grove. Only a few points of rain have fallen since the work of levelling the 400-acre flying field was commenced two month ago. Ploughs, scoops and scarifiers tore up the area, but with no moisture in the soil after a record drought period, the rollers were unable to consolidate the earth. A slight breeze causes clouds of dust to appear over the airmen's township, while conditions are intensified when a 'plane Takes off or alights on the field.

# STUDLEY PARK Sold to Military

Mr. A. A. Gregory informed this newspaper on Monday night that he had disposed of his Studley Park property to the Military Department. The sale was completed on Thursday last, after negotiation had been in progress for more than two month. Fronting the Hume Highway near Narellan, the property comprises, about 200 acres, a palatial home, and 1 of the beat country golf courses in the State. Much of the furniture, including carpets and floor coverings originally cost about £700, will remain in the house.

It is understood that the military authorities will maintain the golf Course, and the arrangements with the Camden Golf Club, which used the course as its headquarters, will be continued.

The property will be used as the Eastern Command Training School.

Flying Officer Andrew Macarthur Onslow entered the Central Flying School at Camden on Monday.

Jack and Alan Hoare have joined up with the 7th A.I.F. They are the sons Of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hoare, of Chellaston Street, Camden.

# 27<sup>th</sup> June 1940 DISTRICT PLEDGE to Stand by Men Who Have Enlisted

In appreciation of the sacrifices they were making the Mayor of Camden (Aid. H. S. Kelloway) pledged the Camden district to stand behind the local men who have enlisted, while they are serving.

This pledge was given on Friday night when eight hundred people packed the Camden Agricultural Hall to honour twenty members of the A.I.F, Mr. W. S. Cruikshank (president) explained to the gathering that the public farewell function had been arranged by the Camden District Soldiers and Citizens' Association, which had been formed only a week earlier. The objects of the association, he said, were not only to farewell the lads going overseas, but to welcome them back as victors and liberators after they had overcome the scourge of Nazism.
