YOUNGEST DIGGER IN PRESENT A.I.F. This newspaper nominates 16 year old Private Ernest Deane, of Campbelltown, as the "baby" of the present A.I.F. He enlisted in July last year at the age of 15 1/2 years. No matter what the official military records would disclose, we'll wager a new hat that Ernie Deane was born at Campbelltown on January 26 (Australia Day), 1925. As he left these shores a well known machine-gun unit around about December last, he possibly celebrated his 16th birthday when in the vicinity of Palestine. Ernest is a son of Mrs. N. Deane and the late W. O. C. Deane, of Campbelltown. His battalion mates include quite a number of Camden and Campbelltown lads, many of whom transferred to the A.I.F. from the 1/21st Machine Gun (Militia) Regiment.

Ban on Photos Anyone seen taking photos in the vicinity of the R.A.A.F. Central Flying School at Camden are viewed with a certain amount of suspicion. Recently someone sighted a motorcyclist with a camera near Macquarie Grove Bridge, and promptly reported the matter. Police eventually visited the photographer's studio at Fairfield to check up. They found that the camera-man was well-known Press photographer, Mr, S. H, E. Young, who, during one of his many visits' to Camden, was admiring the rustic beauty of Macquarie Grove, Being a former member of the R.A.A.F. and A.L.F.; Mr. Young, instead of being peeved, was delighted to Learn that someone had enough initiative to report the matter.

Official Photographer: Mr. Young is to-day n lieutenant on the reserve. He joined the R.A.A.F. during the 1914-1918 War, and was later transferred to Army Corps as an official Australian photographer. His outstanding craftsmanship in war-torn France and Belgium gained him the King's commission. Some of his photographs were for army records, others, including several taken of the Duke of Windsor (then Prince of Wales) in the battle areas, were widely distributed by departmental circles. Mr. Young, too, was responsible for many of the earliest aviation pictures ever produced in England.

Elderslie boys, Roy and Eric Longley, have completed their anti-submarine training at one of the British naval colleges. In a letter to their parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Longley, now of Manly, they stated that they expected be drafted to the Mediterranean at any time, as submarine detectors on one of the British flotilla-leader destroyers of the Javelin class. 
