5th September 1940

The first consignment of scrap metal for steel manufacture was despatched from Camden on Thursday last by Mr. B. F. Young, of Werombi, who plans to collect about 100 tons by October and donate the proceeds from the sales to local district patriotic organisations.' Thursday's collection of scrap weighed nine tons and was gathered at Orangeville, Werombi and Camden. Wollondilly Shire and the Camden Council assisted with the carting, while Messrs. Young and J. Clowes (Orangeville) helped with the loading.

Thirty-five members of an A.I.F. signalling section, comprising officers and men, enjoyed a "get-together" dinner at the Camden Roadside Inn last week. Colonel Whitehead was in charge of the party.
